District Drops Face Mask Requirement

Face masks will become optional for all students and staff inside Dearborn Public Schools starting on Wednesday, Feb. 23 as students return from mid-winter break. Under federal law, masks will still be required on all school buses. Well-fitting masks are also still required for anyone returning from quarantine less than 10 days after their exposure. (See our quarantine guidelines.) Those unable or unwilling to wear a mask need to complete the full 10 day quarantine at home. 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
Hala's Book Recs by Hala Ali

Warcross isn't just a game for the millions who check in every day: it's a way of life. This addiction began 10 years ago, and its fans following stretches around the globe, with several trying to escape reality and others trying to make a profit. Emika Chen, a young hacker, works as a bounty hunter, chasing down players who wager on the game illegally. However, the world of bounty hunters is a competitive one, and survival has not been easy. Emika, desperate for money, takes a chance and hacks into the first game of the worldwide warcross champions, only to accidentally glitch herself into the action and become an overnight superstar. • What do you do in your free time?

• If you weren't a teacher, what would you want to do instead?

I love teaching. I actually was excited about getting this job. I was at Edsel, so I was teaching High School. I taught 9th graders, which is as close to middle school as you can get. I love middle school. Middle schoolers are still fun and silly. High Schoolers start to get a little bit more tough and bravado. I love teaching English. I've also taught psychology, social studies, and Elementary. There's good in all of the grades and subjects, but honestly middle school is definitely where it's at.

• What is something that your students may not know about you?

I don't think they know I'm funny. I was voted class clown in High School. People meet me, and if I'm doing Union work or organizing work, they see me as really serious, but they don't know that I'm..Just like your mom, we both grew up together, and she's super hilarious. They also don't know, like, I'm a real softy. Like, I'm really strict, but if I see a kid is struggling at home, struggling with money, I'll cover them, I'll help them, I'll do whatever. I'll show up to a kid's house and clean for them if they need it.

• What is your plan after retirement?

I don't know really. I feel like they're at the political level, they're gutting it so much, there won't be retirement left. So, I don't know how much longer we'll have public school teaching.

• Why did you choose to teach at Salina?

This was the first place I applied at Dearborn. I've taught at Fordson, Edsel, and now Salina. Mrs. Ahmed took over and she had a position that was exactly what I do, I teach part time, and I jumped on it.

- What is the best advice you can give us students about life or school?
- Learn how to think, not what to think. I think it's really dangerous when kids just memorize stuff or chase the grade, and all you want to do is bully or annoy a teacher to get a grade. Really, I've seen High School students that when they graduate, they can't read, they can't write, they can't do math, because they've basically bullied their teacher, their parents have bullied teachers to give them certain grades. Or, they've learned how to cheat the system, y'know? At some point, you're going to have to actually show if you know the skill that you think you have based on your grades. It's like a doctor who cheats through medical school, eventually you're gonna be standing in front of somebody and have to know what to do.

• What is your favorite sport? Why?


