Amjaad's Ka'ak Recipe

Dough Ingredients: 1 cup plain whole fat yogurt $\frac{1}{2}$ cup vegetable oil 1 whole egg at room temperature 1 tbsp white vinegar 1 tbsp room temperature ghee 3 tbsp baking powder 3 cups all purpose flour Pinch of salt

Filling & Topping: Date paste 2 egg yolks 1 tbsp milk Black nigella seeds

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
- 2. Combine all the dough ingredients in a stand mixer. Use the dough handle attachment and beat on medium-high speed until the dough comes together in one piece and the sides of the mixing bowl is clean. If you are using a regular bowl, transfer the mixed dough onto a generously floured surface and knead it until the dough is smooth.
- 3. Cover the dough with plastic wrap and allow it to rest for 30 to 60 minutes.
- 4. Use a rolling pin to roll out the dough on a generously floured surface. About 3/4 to 1 inch.
- 5. Use a round cookie cutter to cut out circles.
- 6. Fill the dough circles with date paste, fold in half, then seal the edges. The traditional method is to crimp a braid, but you can seal your ka'ak in any way you like.
- 7. Arrange the ka'ak on a sheet pan lined with parchment paper. Mix the egg yolks and milk then brush the mixture onto all the ka'ak.
- 8. Top off the ka'ak with black nigella seeds.
- 9. Bake until golden brown.
